## WHAT'S IN A SHIP NAME

The names of cargo ships of Holland America Line all end in dyk, explains Kees van Buren of Gemeente Rotterdam, the city's archives. Since much of the Netherlands is below sea level, the water is kept at bay by the use of dikes or dyks. Therefore, cargo ships were names for certain dyks, like the Schiedyk or the Katsedyk. Passenger ships, on the other hand, were, and are, named after dams. Most of the major rivers in the Netherlands have dams to hold water for irrigation. Hence Maasdam is named for the dam on the Maas River; Amesterdam for a dam on the Amstel River. Ryndam is named for one of the greatest rivers in all of Europe, The Rhine. Call it Rhenus (ancient), Rhein (German), Rhin (French), or Rijin (Dutch), to most it is the Rhine. Through recorded history, at least for 2000 years, it has been the leading waterway in Europe. As the main artery between the heart of Europe and the North Sea, the Rhine fostered the growth of Rotterdam into one of the greatest seaports in the world.


